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At our meeting on August 13, Chuck Olson introduced the speaker, Rotarian Al Conard, whose topic was "The Temptations of St. Anthony."

All of the paintings used the same theme; namely, St. Anthony being tempted by evil in various forms, monsters, the devil, earthly pleasures, etc.--and resisting these temptations. One characteristic St. Anthony showed in nearly all of the paintings by various artists was that no matter how severe the temptation, St. Anthony maintained a calm and composed presence in confronting the evil temptations.

Al concluded his presentation by reminding us that the universality of a theme can persist over a long period of time, especially when it regards an individual who exerts tremendous impact on mankind. With St. Anthony, we are able to see that a man with an idea can influence thousands of people for thousands of years.
