Responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Disaster Response Committee (DRC)

Less than a month after COVID-19 hit our community, the Board of Directors formed the Disaster Response Committee and set up a Pandemic Response Fund to provide for community needs related to the COVID-19 Pandemic. The DRC's priorities included providing personal protective equipment for frontline workers identifying and supplying unmet needs in human service organizations. Thanks to the generosity of Rotarians, friends and hard working Committee members, they raised more than \$62,000 and awarded grants.

Providing for Local Needs

This was both a year of challenge and accomplishment. A pandemic is never anticipated, but upon its arrival, its impact was significant. It affected every aspect of Community Services, but our committees adjusted to the challenge and exceeded expectations.

The Community Allocations Committee (CAC) processed 44 applications—a recent record— and granted \$62,500 to 13 community nonprofits. In addition, the CAC sponsored a district grant of \$7,500 to the Children's Literacy Network, providing both Rotary volunteers and money for the BookPals project.

Providing for Local Needs

Veteran's Initiative

On November 5, 2019, the Club sponsored a hiring event for unemployed veterans. This project began in 2015, and has grown every year, attracting more employers and veterans. Since the project's inception, 471 veterans have participated and have earned over \$2 million.

Doers of Good Service (DOGS)

Last fall DOGS participated in helping rebuild the Eberwhite Playground along with other volunteers in the community.

Girls on the Run

Seven Rotarians provided the staff for the pre-run activities for the girls. Our Rotarians helped Girls on the Run by leading six different activities: hula hoops, a photo shoot with fun frames, a plastic fruit toss, star power, a gratitude garden, and card making for seniors at St. Joseph Village. It was a lot of fun and many, many girls participated along with their families. It was great visibility for Rotary in the community.

Rotary Fights Hunger

This year's goal was to raise \$15,000 in cash and enough food for 90,000 meals. However, due to the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, closing of schools and suspension of our weekly lunch

meetings, members did not have the opportunity to make in-person donations. Despite these hurdles we raised more than \$26,500 which was matched by another donor. The end result is we collected enough for 160,000 meals—double last year's results!

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)

This program provides free tax preparation to low-income individuals and families, allowing them to receive the maximum refund possible, to meet current basic needs or save for the future. Support and training are provided by knowledgeable volunteers, United Way employees, the Michigan Department of Treasury, the Detroit Accounting Aid Society, and the IRS. Rotarian volunteers can serve as Intake and Exit Specialists, Tax Preparers or Quality Reviewers. This year volunteers logged in 2,360 + hours helping to complete over 1,000 tax returns securing clients over \$2 million of refunds and avoided preparation fees.

Helping Youth Develop

Rotaract Club

The Club's Rotaract Committee supports and mentors members of the University of Michigan Rotaract Club in providing its mission to create community by working together to provide local, national, and international service. This year, Rotaractors provided service to numerous local organizations including Food Gatherers, Natural Area Preservation, and Rockin' for the Hungry. Our Rotaract Committee is thrilled to be working with these dedicated students and believes they do a magnificent job of demonstrating "service above self" even after they graduate.

Fifteen Rotaractors performed international service over their spring break by traveling to El Porvenir, Honduras to volunteer with the Honduras Child Alliance. Working alongside locals and other volunteers, they helped put a new roof on a building to be used as a school. They are now experts in construction carpentry! This is the third time our students have worked in this location, and many have said the relationships they forged have had a lasting impact on them.

Our Rotaract Committee is thrilled to be working with these dedicated students and believes they do a magnificent job of demonstrating "service above self" even after they graduate.

Interact Clubs

RCAA also sponsors two Interact clubs at Ann Arbor Pioneer and Huron High Schools. Both clubs participate in community activities related to food insecurity, environmental issues and polio eradication. On March 13, the Ann Arbor Public Schools canceled school and all activities due to the COVID-19 virus. All Rotary volunteers were asked to leave and schools were closed.

Helping Youth Achieve

Students Taking a Renewed Interest in the Values of Education (STRIVE)

The STRIVE scholarship program completed its 22nd year in 2020. Rotarians who participate in this program mentor students attending Ann Arbor's Pathways to Success Academic Campus. The Rotarians guide mentees through their senior year and prepare them for the next step in their educational journey through monthly group meetings and individual face to face meetings. Clearly, the COVID-19 pandemic created many hurdles but in the end, the energetic and creative committee persevered, maintaining contact with their mentees virtually to the end of the school year. This year, the RCAA awarded a record \$25,200 in scholarships to 17 Pathways to Success who committed to performing well in high school and pursuing higher education. The students will use the scholarships to attend Washtenaw Community College.

Service Above Self Scholarships

Service Above Self scholarships are awarded to students attending Washtenaw Community College who demonstrate the Rotary trait "service above self." Our Club awarded eight scholarships, \$1,250 per semester, with an option for renewal.

Rotary Readers and Tutors

Rotary Readers and Tutors, whose purpose is to foster a love of reading and books at a young age, had another strong year until their work was cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. Seventeen Rotarians tutored students at Angell, Burns Park and Northside elementary schools, Clague Middle School and Skyline High School. Four tutors helped preschoolers at Beatty Early Learning Center in Ypsilanti. Each class had 10–12 children.

Paulie helps End Polio Now

PURPLE, not maize and blue, was the color that the Rotary Club of Ann Arbor chose to help raise funds for End Polio Now. PURPLE, as in Paulie, the Purple Polio Bear a ten inch stuffed teddy bear, sporting a purple sweater with the End Polio Now logo. Handknit by Rotarians in the UK, Paulie was a big hit when he came to Ann Arbor, and he was photographed with Rotarians and Rotaractors around town. Paulie's photos were featured during the month leading up to World Polio Day on the on the club's website, Facebook page and at meetings. District Governor "Sparky" Leonard auctioned off Paulie at the club's Polio Day meeting netting \$2,000 for the End Polio Now program. The club proudly sent \$28,416 to Rotary International, with the Gates Foundation matching that donation 2:1, the total donation was \$85,248.

International Humanitarian Projects Committee (IHPC)

The IHPC developed and approved a new project application and tracking process. The system will help the club apply for and track district grants and global grants, as well as meeting minutes and financial reports. 

Golf and Tennis Outing






Being Good Financial Stewards

Foundation/Endowment


Our Club's permanent endowment was established in the 1980's to provide a sustainable and consistent source to fund our Club's local and global grants, projects and scholarships. The annual distribution from the Foundation portfolio have risen in FY 2020 to \$77,913, increased from \$74,104 in FY 2019, and averaging 6.8% annual increase over the past 15 years. In FY 2020 (July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020) gifts to the RCAA Foundation totaled \$48,238. The principal balance in the endowment on June 30, 2020 was \$2,225,562.





Operations

Our club operations were balanced for 2020 in spite of a decline in revenue due to the loss of members. Our loss in income due to our decline in membership was recovered by no longer meeting in person at the Michigan Union thereby saving on expenses.
