Providing for Local Needs

The COVID-19 pandemic brought on special challenges to our fundraising efforts for our projects in 2020-21. But, as is our way, the members of the RCAA stepped up to the plate. This year, the Community Allocations Committee (CAC) processed 30 applications, which was down from the previous year, most likely a result of many organizations' services being on hold due to the pandemic. We were able to fund 12 local nonprofit organizations' projects. Additionally, we received a District grant to support the work of the Children's Literacy Network. A total of \$57,000 was given to our local community.

Providing for Local Needs

Veteran's Initiative

The RCAA is committed to helping our local veterans. Once again, RCAA members assisted Hire MI Vet with their 6th Annual Hiring Event. Hire MI Vet connects unemployed veterans and local employers to help our men and women who served in our armed forces gain employment. As with most events this year, Hire MI Vet went virtual through facilities from Washtenaw Community College. In attendance were 68 veterans, 30 employers, and five Rotarians, which culminated in another successful hiring event.

During November, the Veteran's Initiative committee collected personal hygiene kit materials from RCAA members and the public to donate for VA Ann Arbor veterans. On a brisk December day just prior to the year-end holidays, RCAA members bundled up and assembled 100 personal hygiene kits outdoors on picnic tables at the County Farm Park. The kits were then delivered to the VA Hospital where they were distributed to homeless veterans.

Doers of Good Service (DOGS)

In September 2020 and April 2021, the RCAA Road Waste Warriors attacked the 2.1 mile stretch on the I-94 corridor between State St. and Platt Rd. during the Club's newly instituted participation in the State of Michigan Adopt-A-Highway Program. Club members (i.e., enemies of roadway trash) swept the area clean of a total of 117 bags of trash, plus various other items including car parts, pieces of tires, cell phones, a computer tablet, a boogie board, and one gold lamé skirt. Afterwards, in the Kensington Hotel parking lot, a much-missed,

Rotary Fights Hunger

For the second year, our Rotary Fights Hunger food drive was virtual due to the pandemic. Food Gatherers' partners reported as much as a 300% increase in people seeking assistance and 40% of visitors had never used a food pantry before. Mindful of this increased need, our goal for 2021 was a very ambitious 150,000 meals. Because of the generosity of our Club members and the community, we raised 155,706 meals for the hungry in our community.

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA)

The VITA program provides free tax preparation to low-income individuals and families, allowing them to receive the maximum refund possible to meet current basic needs or save for the future. Support and training are provided by knowledgeable volunteers, United Way employees, the Michigan Department of Treasury, the Detroit Accounting Aid Society, and the IRS. Rotarian volunteers serve as Intake and Exit Specialists, Tax Preparers, or Quality Reviewers. This year, the COVID-19 pandemic had a significant adverse impact on the program, requiring all returns be done virtually. A smaller number of volunteers were engaged due to licensing costs of software use. Nevertheless, volunteers completed 535 tax returns, securing clients over \$1.3 million of refunds and avoiding preparation fees of over \$149,000.

Helping Youth Develop

Rotaract Club

The Club's Rotaract Committee supports and mentors members of the University of Michigan Rotaract Club in its mission to create community by working together to provide local, national, and international service. In this challenging year of the pandemic, our Rotaractors did a fabulous job of pivoting to regular virtual zoom meetings. They scheduled and listened to many engaging speakers, played lots of games, supported each other through difficult times, and got to know each other in new and different ways. Small groups also did several local service activities, always being mindful of socially distant protocol. The Mentor Program was a huge success with 21 matches, and the students created an informative and helpful Mentor Program Handbook. Since Rotaractors were unable to go to Honduras to work with the Honduras Child Alliance (HCA) as planned, they maintained an ongoing connection with the organization and supported several of its programs virtually. Examples of their contributions included creating a volunteer handbook and developing ideas that HCA interns could use for delivering online curricula to children. Our Rotaract Committee is thrilled to be working with these dedicated UM students and believes they do a magnificent job of demonstrating Service Above Self even after they graduate. We are proud to have our Rotaractors become the future leaders of Rotary wherever they may roam.

Interact Clubs

RCAA also sponsors two Interact Clubs at Ann Arbor Pioneer and Huron High Schools. Both clubs continued to meet regularly via Zoom. Despite the pandemic, Interactors stayed very active and the Pioneer Club was able to conduct a volunteer activity most every month. Additionally, the students heard talks from our Club's Rosemarie Rowney and Collyer Smith, who spoke about mental health issues, particularly for young people, and Rotary's efforts to eradicate polio.

On a bittersweet note, Pioneer faculty advisor Jen Kunec retired. She had served with the Pioneer Interact since it formed in 2005 and did a tremendous job keeping the students connected and active in this pandemic year. We thank Jen for her support of and guidance to the Pioneer Interactors over these past 16 years.

Helping Youth Achieve

Students Taking a Renewed Interest in the Value of Education (STRIVE)

The STRIVE scholarship program completed its 23rd year in 2021. The program utilized the historical design of Rotarian volunteers offering to mentor high school seniors at Ann Arbor's Pathways to Success Academic Campus for potential scholarships to Washtenaw Community College (WCC) funded by RCAA. Monthly group meetings and invited speakers were utilized to provide support to Pathways seniors invited into the program by the Pathways guidance counselor. The 2020-2021 STRIVE program was conducted virtually through Zoom meetings due to the COVID-19 pandemic, which challenged our engagement with students.

Based upon the GPA criteria and other named scholarship guidelines, the RCAA offered scholarships ranging from \$1200 to \$3000 (to be awarded upon enrollment at WCC) to 11 graduating seniors from Pathways, for a total amount across the qualifying recipients of \$19,520. The scholarships were announced during the Pathways graduation ceremonies on June 1, 2021 with nice recognition of RCAA.

Service Above Self Scholarships

Service Above Self scholarships are awarded to students attending Washtenaw Community College who demonstrate the Rotary trait Service Above Self. Our Club awarded 5 scholarships for \$1,250 per semester and one \$500 per semester scholarship. All scholarships have options for renewal.

Rotary Readers and Tutors

Rotary Readers and Tutors, whose purpose is to foster a love of reading and books at a young age, had another strong year until their work was cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic. Seventeen Rotarians tutored students at Angell, Burns Park, and Northside Elementary Schools, as well as at Clague Middle School and Skyline High School in Ann Arbor. Four tutors helped preschoolers at Beatty Early Learning Center in Ypsilanti, where each class had 10-12 children. We look forward to returning in full force in the fall of 2021.

Working with Global Partners

International Humanitarian Projects Committee (IHPC)

During 2020-21, the IHPC received a budget allocation of \$17,500 that included proceeds raised from the Golf and Tennis Outing Reenvisioned fundraiser. Individual contributions accounted for an additional \$1,500, and funding that was set aside for a canceled project in Jamaica was returned to the budget.

Major initiatives included the approval of a Global Grant in Ghana for the construction of a borehole in a remote part of the country. IHPC received District Grants for three projects: one designed to recruit women for fistula repair in Ghana, another for continued support for the Haiti Nursing Foundation to

purchase equipment for remote teaching during the pandemic, and one for a revised proposal from the UM Rotaract to also enable remote teaching in Honduras. We partnered with the Rotary Club of Ann Arbor North on a Rotary Club of Pune Metro project in India to support the creation of additional oxygenated beds owing to the high number of COVID cases. Also supported was the second phase of a Copperbelt Malaria Initiative that subsequently became Rotary International's first Program of Scale. Despite a global pandemic, the RCAA was still able to make a difference around the world!



Golf and Tennis Outing (GTO) Reenvisioned



We were able to create a successful endeavor to raise funds for our good works through two events. On August 17, 2020, Rotarians attended a virtual Midsummer Italian Dinner and heard a talk about Italian wines by Paesano Restaurant owner Michael Roddy with Chaad Thomas. We then held an online auction to raise further funds to Help Kids Succeed. These events raised \$30,000 for this year's Club projects, demonstrating, yet again, that the Rotarians of our Club are poised to do their part no matter the circumstances.




Being Good Financial Stewards

Foundation/Endowment


Our Club's permanent endowment was established in the 1980s to provide a sustainable and consistent source to fund our Club's local and global grants, projects, and scholarships. This year, the annual distribution from the Foundation portfolio, averaging a 6% annual increase over the past 15 years, rose from \$77,913 in FY 2020 to \$81,373. In FY 2021 (July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021), gifts to the RCAA Foundation totaled \$36,500. The principal balance in the endowment on June 30, 2021 was \$2,985,237.97.






Operations
